2 Environmental Policy

It is Northern Ireland Motor Club's aim to improve work to minimise the environmental impact of the event by implementing measures in accordance with the FIA's sustainability programme. The event will organise itself and review its actions, behaviours, and the way it runs its event to ensure it remains consistent with this commitment.

All involved with Northern Ireland Motor Club and the Ulster Rally, will consciously make every effort to minimise the environmental impact by putting in practice the following actions:

- Comply with all applicable legal requirements which relate to environmental aspects and impacts.
- Measure and monitor our environmental performance to have full understanding of the environmental impacts of our event.
- Promote sustainability and environmental awareness and involve internal and external stakeholders in reaching the objectives.
- Evaluate the wider impacts of our activities through our suppliers, entrants/competitors and partners, and work with these stakeholders to achieve our sustainability goals.

- Educate our teams, competitors, officials, and volunteers about environmentally responsible behaviours.
- Reduce paper usage to help reduce CO₂, deforestation, pollution, and avoiding printing to save resources and energy.
- Actively pursue ways to reduce our carbon footprint and where appropriate use recognised carbon offsetting schemes with the goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030.
- Put measures in place to ensure our activities do not pollute, cause permanent damage to the ecosystem, or threaten biodiversity, wildlife, and ancient species.
- Make efficient use of natural resources and seek to minimise our consumption of energy wherever practical.
- Reduce our consumption of materials, minimise our production of waste and seek opportunities for re-use and recycling of any necessary waste materials.
- Ensure any waste management companies comply with the specifications of any necessary environmental certifications
- Consider the sources of the goods we use and consume, and wherever possible use sustainable supplies from ethical and environmentally responsible suppliers.
- Seek to gain accreditation for our Environmental Management System as part of the Motorsport UK and FIA Environmental Sustainability Programmes in 2026 and develop this system towards full compliance with the ISO 14001 standard by 2030.

This policy will be published on the Ulster Rally website and monitored regularly for updating when and if necessary.

3 Event History

The Northern Ireland Motor Club and the Ulster Rally both have a long and distinguished history. Formed over 45 years ago, the Northern Ireland Motor Club (NIMC) continues to successfully organise and promote the Ulster Rally as we know it today.

The first seeds were sown more than 90 years ago, when the Parliament of Northern Ireland passed the Northern Ireland Road Races Act, which allowed public roads to be closed for motor racing. The Act allowed for ten road-closing orders to be issued annually, eight of which were granted to the motorcycle fraternity, while two were issued to car sport.

That marked the beginning of closed road rallying in Northern Ireland, which led towards the inaugural Ulster Rally in 1976.

Origins and Early Years (1976–1985)

- The Ulster Rally was first run in 1976, marking the start of a now-longstanding international rally on closed public roads in Northern Ireland.
- The inaugural event drew a high-quality entry list with Cahal Curley winning in a Porsche Carrera.
- Across the late 1970s and early 1980s the event quickly became a key round of the newly formed Irish Tarmac Rally Championship, attracting top drivers and international rally stars such as Pennti Airikkala, Russell Brookes, Bertie Fisher and Jimmy McRae.
- By the mid-1980s iconic Group B and Group A cars like the Audi Quattro and Ford Sierra Cosworth were winning overall, cementing Ulster's reputation as a competitive international asphalt rally.

Growth and International Recognition (1986–2000)

- Throughout the late 1980s and 1990s, Ulster attracted both British Rally Championship and Irish Tarmac Rally Championship competitors, with winners including well-known names such as Gwyndaf Evans, Colin McRae, Malcolm Wilson, Bertie Fisher and Mark Lovell.
- The event was known for high-punctuation class battles and strong local competition as well as international entries, helping it grow into one of the marquee rallies in the British Isles.
- Several years saw cancellations or changes — for example 2001 was cancelled — but the event returned strongly in subsequent seasons.



Modern Era – Rally of Championships (2000–2015)

- In the 2000s the Ulster Rally regularly featured World Rally Cars and became a round of prestigious series such as the British Rally Championship (BRC) and Irish Tarmac Rally Championship (ITRC), drawing international stars and top domestic crews.
- Winners in this period included Kris Meeke in a Subaru Impreza WRC and multiple victories for Eugene Donnelly and Mark Higgins.
- The rally's status was recognised with awards, and it was often regarded as one of the best international rallies on the British Rally Championship calendar.

Recent Years (2016–2025)

- Into the mid-2010s and beyond, the Ulster Rally continued to alternate between prominent championship status and evolving formats, including strong ties to both the BRC and ITRC.
- 2016 saw a BRC return and a strong performance from Elfyn Evans (Fiesta R5).
- In 2021, British Rally Champion Matt Edwards sealed his title at Ulster, underscoring its importance in championship battles.
- The 2020s have seen the rally remain central to Irish rallying, continuing to host top crews

2025 and Beyond – Milestones and Modern Competitions

- The 2025 Modern Tyres Ulster Rally (held August 15–16) was won by Callum Devine and Noel O'Sullivan, marking a major achievement in Irish Tarmac Rally Championship competition.
- 2025 also marked the final year on the current Armagh/Banbridge/Craigavon route after six successful seasons.
- Looking ahead, the Ulster Rally celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2026 and will feature as part of the Irish Tarmac Rally Championship and will also host rounds of the FIA European Historic Rally Championship, bringing classic and modern machinery together.

Support (Trade) plates, if ordered, which must be **affixed** to the front of the vehicle, will be allowed into Service Parks.

All service crews must use a ground sheet.

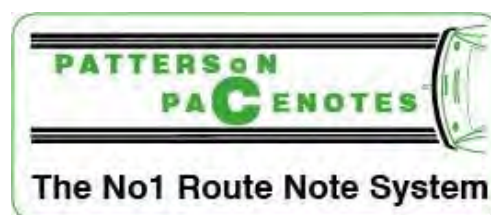

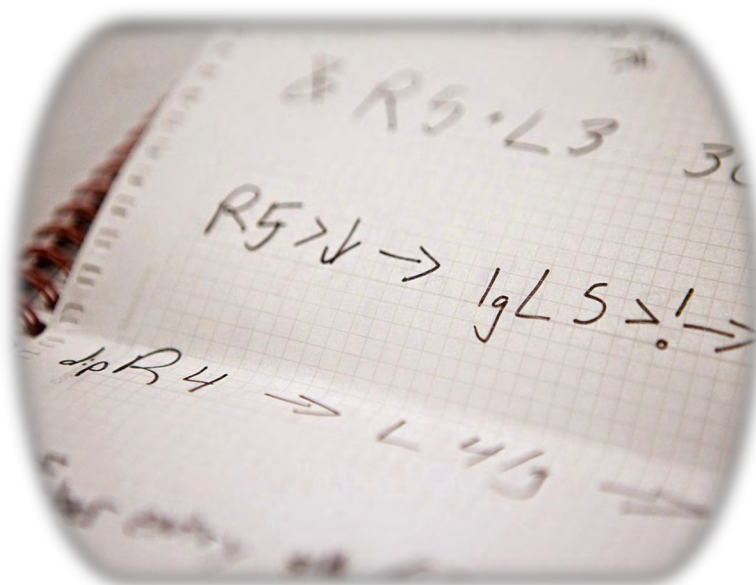

12 Useful Facts

Ballymena is a town in County Antrim, Northern Ireland. It had a population of 31,205 people at the 2021 United Kingdom census, making it the seventh largest town in Northern Ireland by population. It is part of the Borough of Mid and East Antrim.

The town was built on the Braid River, on land given to the Adair family by King Charles I in 1626, with a right to hold two annual fairs and a Saturday market in perpetuity. Surrounding villages are Cullybackey, Ahoghill, Broughshane, and Kells-Connor.

Driving in Northern Ireland

Many road signs will be in both English and Irish languages.

Driving Licence

You should always carry a valid driver's licence and proof of vehicle insurance when you drive. It is a criminal offence to refuse or give false details when needed to do so.

You can use your national driving licence but must have reached the minimum age to drive a vehicle in Northern Ireland. You must be:

- 17 years or over to ride a motorcycle with a cylinder capacity not exceeding 125cc, or power not exceeding 11kW
- 19 years or over to ride a motorcycle not exceeding 35kW
- 21 years or older to ride a motorcycle unlimited in size/ power
- 17 years old or more to drive a car

A provisional (learner's) driving licence issued abroad is not valid for use in Northern Ireland.

Motor Insurance

You must not drive a vehicle from abroad in Northern Ireland without adequate motor insurance. If you do not hold an insurance certificate valid for Northern Ireland, arrangements should be made before travel.

The minimum cover is third-party insurance.

If driving a rented vehicle you should make sure that any insurance provided covers driving in Northern Ireland and in Republic of Ireland if you will drive in both.

Vehicles

Vehicles in Northern Ireland are usually fitted with the driver seat on the right-hand side of the vehicle and vehicles are driven on the left-hand side of the road.

You should take time before driving off to familiarise yourself with the various controls in the vehicle especially steering, foot-pedals, gearstick, lights, indicators and wipers.

You should adjust things such as your seating, mirrors, lights to make sure that you can drive the vehicle safely and with comfort.

Lights

You must use:

- sidelights between sunset and sunrise
- headlights at night (between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise)
- headlights when visibility is seriously reduced - generally to less than 100m

You may use front and rear fog lights when visibility is reduced but must switch them off when visibility improves.

You must not use any lights in a way which would dazzle or cause discomfort to other road users, including pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders.

If you are driving a left-hand drive vehicle you should make sure that, if used, the headlights are adjusted for driving on the left, or you risk being stopped by the police and as a result fined up to £1,000.

Rules of the Road

Always drive on the left side of the road unless road signs or markings show different.

You must remember to keep left every time you drive, every time you come to an intersection and every time you pull out on to a road.

Always check for other road users and signal your intentions before driving off, changing position on the road, changing direction or stopping and parking.

Do not cross the centre line unless safely passing or turning off the road.

Many roads have a single lane each way and some provide passing lanes at intervals. Some narrow roads don't have centre line markings to guide you.

You must never cross a solid white line on your side of the centre line to overtake a vehicle, as this shows it is too dangerous to overtake.

A double white centre line means that no traffic (on either side of the road) can overtake other vehicles.

If you do not have a solid white line on your side of the centre line, it is only safe to overtake when you can see that the road ahead is clear.

Think before overtaking and never overtake on or near a corner.

On a two-lane dual carriageway you should use the left-hand lane and only use the right-hand lane for overtaking slower moving traffic and return to the left-hand lane when it is safe to do so. You may need to use the right-hand lane if turning right on a dual carriageway.

At a stop sign, you must come to a complete stop, then give way (give priority) to all traffic.

At a give-way sign, you must give way to all traffic on the intersecting road.

If turning, you must also give way to vehicles that are not turning.

Speed Limits

Speed limits are the absolute maximum speed you should drive at for a particular road and you should always reduce your speed to take account of:

- road condition
- the presence of other users, particularly vulnerable users like walkers, cyclists and motorcyclists
- weather conditions
- visibility
- time of day

Speed limits in Northern Ireland are shown in miles per hour (mph) while speed limits in the Republic of Ireland are shown in kilometers per hour (km/ h).

The most common speed limits you will find in Northern Ireland are:

- in built up areas: up to 30 mph unless shown different
- outside built-up areas: 60 mph
- motorways and dual carriageways up to 70 mph
- variable speed limits set by overhead signs/ roadside signs may be seen on motorways
- 20 mph limits are increasingly common in built up areas

A car towing a caravan or trailer:

- must not use the outside lane of a motorway with three or more lanes
- be restricted to 50 mph on single carriageway roads outside built-up areas
- be restricted to 60 mph on dual carriageways and motorways

Seat Belts

If fitted, seat belts must be worn in the front and rear of vehicles by all occupants.

Drinking and Driving / Drug Taking and Driving

The maximum level of alcohol allowed in the blood is 80 milligrammes in 100 millilitres of blood.

It is an offence to drive if you are impaired through drugs, though there are no set limits for individual drugs.

The police may carry out tests to detect a driver who may be under the influence of drink or drugs.

If you fail these tests, it is liable to result in prosecution.

If you are on medication, which may impair your driving, you should talk to a doctor before driving.

Sharing the Road

The Highway Code tell you when you should give way to other users.

You must watch for people crossing the road, particularly at pedestrian (or zebra) crossings and intersections.

Always slow down near cyclists. Pass slowly and only when safe and try to leave a space of 1.5 metres.

If you see animals on the road, slow down and move on carefully. Do not sound your horn.

Watch for Bus Lanes

Be aware that in some cities and certain parts of motorways, there are bus lanes shown by road signs, the words bus lane painted in large letters across the road and occasionally the bus lane will be coloured red.

Only public buses and emergency service vehicles are allowed to use this lane (taxis, motorcycles, bicycles can if the bus lane signs show this). Anyone else will be photographed (automatic cameras) and fined £60 for using this lane.

Mobile Phones

It is illegal to use a hand-held mobile phone while driving in Northern Ireland. The advice is to turn it off or put it on silent until you can pull the car in somewhere safe or until you reach your destination.

Other Information

Power: 240 volts.

Plugs and sockets are of a three-pin design.

Smoking is not permitted by law in enclosed public places and workplaces.

The country code for Northern Ireland and UK is +44.

13 Helicopter Registration
